The Two Johns (<https://esafetytraining.org/>)

The Two Johns are ex police professionals who are experts at helping parents & carers keep their children safe online. Their website has a huge amount of information and advice and there are links to other useful organisations. For ease, they have various social media set ups including Facebook and Twitter that you can follow to be sure you have the latest advice.

Among Us

This is the new 'favourite' amongst the children at school. The Year 6's have even invented a playground version. It's a safe game with age appropriate content for junior age children however it's becoming clear via information from internet safety forums that many users are seeing explicit chat. Also, worryingly, children are joining strangers on third party apps like What's App and Discord as the game becomes easier to play. It might be an idea to check in to see how your children are accessing the game.

The Ever Popular Fortnite

Fortnite continues to be very popular with lots of young people. It is rated PEGI 12 for frequent mild violence which means it is not suitable for persons under 12 years of age. It is also important to bear in mind that when rating games, PEGI do not take into consideration the chat features of a game which Fortnite does include.

Chatting to strangers and inappropriate language:

Fortnite contains voice and text chat. Due to the nature of the game, your child may be chatting to strangers and may hear inappropriate language. Ensure your child knows how to report players for any inappropriate behaviour: <https://www.epicgames.com/help/en-US/fortnite-c75/battle-royale-c93/how-do-i-report-bad-player-behavior-in-fortnite-a3276>.

Parental Controls

Fortnite includes a number of parental controls to help you make it a safer environment for your child including disabling voice chat, filtering language and setting privacy settings. Also, remember to set up age appropriate parental controls on the device your child is playing on as well.

We always recommend playing the game with your child so you can see what they are playing and monitor the sort of chat that they are listening to/contributing to. Remind your child that they should talk to you or another trusted adult if they have any concerns.

Lunchtime Points

Every Thursday, Mrs Prigg will collect the lunch points and during our streamed assembly that day, she will draw out three children. Each of these children will be able to bring one friend for hot chocolate and marshmallows with Mrs Prigg on a Friday morning during Achievers' Assembly. This will take place in the hall and will be staggered due to Covid regulations.

Our pupils can be awarded a lunchtime point for good behaviour in the hall or on the playground, healthy eating and displaying social graces and table manners.
